
FUNDS RAISED AT 2019 CHALLENGE OF THE CHEFS

Hotel Industry Supports More Than 1 in 25 American Jobs

NEW RESEARCH UNDERSCORES SIGNIFICANT ECONOMIC IMPACT OF HOTEL INDUSTRY

Underscoring the significant economic impact and strong growth of the hotel industry, a new study released September 9, 2019, finds that hotels support more than 1 in 25 American jobs—8.3 million in total—and contribute nearly \$660 billion annually to U.S. GDP.

Conducted by Oxford Economics, the study was sponsored by the American Hotel & Lodging Association (AHLA) and the American Hotel & Lodging Educational Foundation (AHELF) and showcases the breadth and depth of the hotel industry and its value to the communities we serve. The study is part of AHLA's Dreams Happen Here campaign, which highlights the ways hotels power our economy, support our employees, grow and groom employees, and serve the world's travelers. The Oxford analysis includes a breakdown of the industry's economic impact in every state and congressional district in America. View the report and additional information here.

This report builds on the dynamic growth the hotel industry has seen in the last decade. Hotel industry sales have increased 43.5 percent since 2010, with 1.3 billion guests staying in American hotels last year. As the industry attracts more guests, employment has expanded to new highs, reaching 2.3 million hotel jobs directly on property—a gain of more than 160,000 hotel jobs since 2015. The total number of U.S. jobs supported by the hotel industry has increased by 1.1 million since 2015.

ADDITIONAL KEY FINDINGS FROM THE RESEARCH INCLUDE:

- Hotels support a total of \$395 billion in wages, salaries and other compensation, both directly at our properties and in the communities we serve.
- A representative hotel with 100 occupied rooms supports more than 240 local jobs and generates \$18.4 million in guest spending.
- For every \$100 hotel guests spend on lodging, another \$222 is spent at the destination—totaling \$278 billion per year spent on transportation, dining, shopping, etc. at U.S. businesses during stays.
- Hotels generate \$186 billion that goes back to communities through local, state and federal taxes.

"Hotels are an industry of opportunity, and we are proud to make dreams come true every day for the millions of guests we serve, and the 8.3 million people whose jobs we support," said Chip Rogers, president and CEO of AHLA. "We are at a critical moment for our industry. Demand for hotels has never been higher, but we are also facing the tightest labor market in a generation."

U.S. Department of Labor figures show there are nearly one million job vacancies in the hospitality sector.

GSA Releases FY2020 Per Diem Rates

The General Services Administration (GSA) has announced the lodging per diem rate for fiscal year 2020 slightly increased from 2019 for the City of Sacramento and Sacramento County. There was no change to the amount for meals and incidental expenses.

The federal per diem rates for FY 2020 went into effect October 1, 2019. For Sacramento, the lodging rate (excluding taxes) is \$140. The daily meals and incidental expenses (M&IE) for FY 2020 remain unchanged at \$66.

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
Ban on Single-use Plastic Bottles Used for Personal Care Products

LAW GOES INTO EFFECT IN 2023 AND 2024

In early October 2019, Gov. Newsom signed into law AB 1162, which bans single-use plastic bottles used for personal care products and imposes fines for noncompliance. The bill, which takes effect in 2023, will apply to lodging properties with more than 50 guest rooms. Properties with fewer than 50 guest rooms must discontinue the use of the small plastic bottles by 2024.

In the new law, the definition of a "small plastic bottle" means a plastic bottle or container with less than a six-ounce capacity that is intended to be nonreusable by the end user.

If a lodging property does not comply with the ban, its owners and operators could be subject to monetary fines. On



Many of the major hotel brands have already taken steps—or are planning—to replace the individual soap, shampoo and conditioner bottles with bulk dispensers in their showers.

This new legislation comes at a time when many cities and companies are moving to ban single-use plastics such as grocery bags, straws and water bottles.

In related actions, a number of hotels are increasing the number of water stations in key public spaces at hotels for guests who wish to refill reusable water bottles. For meetings and events, hotels plan to serve water in carafes or other containers, with bottled water available upon request.
